These are the lines taken from the chapter "The Swapping of Nightmares". In these lines we see that Liesel is worried about her brother's death for which she did not give any importance and feels for the poor soul's death. This nightmare shows us that even though the Jews act as they don't bother for their own family member's being humiliated, rather I would say being killed, they were 'not allowed to express their emotion of loss of a family member.'

Now coming to Hitler's point of view, Hitler has been **Rigid-hearted** person in treating the Jewish race. Hitler did not even acknowledge a Jewish woman nor a child. That is, according to him he did not show any concern to the Jewish race people even if he/she is a grandparent.
