conflicts. Kabir identified discrimination as a significant factor in creating a weak and violent society, and instead advocated for love, integrity, and equality as the true essence of a stable human community.

Das, R. (2016) comparative study examines the contributions of Sankaradeva and Kabir Das, two prominent reformers in India. The research focuses on the Bhakti movement and the ideals preached by both individuals. The study highlights their shared goal of eradicating divisions based on caste, religion, and community, aiming to create a united society. Sankaradeva, in Assam, promoted the Bhakti ideology, emphasizing principles of love, tolerance, and devotion to God. Kabir Das, influenced by Nirguna Bhakti, emphasized a transcendent truth beyond worldly affairs and defined God as Nirguna. Both figures emphasized Bhakti as the superior path to attaining the Supreme Being.

Shah, K. (2017) paper highlights Kabir Das as a significant poet in the Bhakti and Sufi movements of North India. Kabir is recognized as the first saint to bridge Hinduism and Islam, offering a universal path acceptable to both religions. The study portrays Kabir as a reformer and critic, challenging ritualistic and austere approaches to redemption. With his straightforward approach, Kabir questioned various faiths and provided Indian philosophy with a new direction, emphasizing a holistic perspective on human existence.

Sethy, P. (2017) attempted to recreate Kabir's story by looking at where he was born, who his family were, and other unknown information about his early life and development. This article covered Kabir's main philosophies about syncretism by melding the disparity of wealth, higher and lower castes, Hindus and Muslims by his statement to maintain equality, love, compassion, and coexistence to one another in place of enmity, jealousy, egotism, fragmentation, and has shown the way for human beings to appreciate for one another.

Sharma, K. C. (2017) study presents a comparative analysis of Kabir Das, a prominent figure in North India's Bhakti Movement, with the influences of the Sufi Movement, Nanak's teachings (founder of Sikhism), and the life and philosophy of Shaikh Noor-ud Din, the introducer of the Rishi Movement. The authors highlight that these religious philosophies emerged in different parts of India but share a common concept of integrated humanity, belief in a unipotent God, and the significance of love as a foundational element for a constructive society. The article also discusses the development and dissemination of these philosophies by Kabir Das's disciples.

Dabhade, N. Foremost vital ideals that according to the author were most needed even in today's world were protest against caste system, sharing of love to every mankind and religious integrity.

Along with his praxis in the private and public domains, which were integrated rather than separate, were covered.

Samadder, N. (2019) analysis focuses on Kabir Das, a saint poet of the Bhakti period, highlighting his life, ideals, and enduring relevance in society today. According to the author, Kabir's teachings were foundational in creating a constructive, caste-neutral, and unified society free from religious and social barriers. Samadder emphasizes Kabir's teachings of human morality, including good conduct, honesty, simplicity, and love, which contribute to the integrity of mankind. Furthermore, Kabir's ideals of peace, non-violence, and standing against corrupt social and ruling systems serve as inspiration for discerning right from wrong in the contemporary world.

Jyoti, D. (2021) discussion focuses on Kabir's teachings of equality found in his couplets and their relevance in the context of India. The research explores Kabir's staunch defiance of the caste system's hierarchical structure. The study highlights Kabir's significant influence on figures like Ambedkar, as both were victims of the same socio-religious background. The author connects Kabir's rebellious voice and rejection of the intellectual authority and exclusive knowledge system of the Brahmins to challenge the operationalization of caste hierarchies by religious authorities. The research also references Kanwal Bharti's remarks, stating that religious authority, similar to Kabir, was an important issue for Ambedkar.
